Leader Logistics: Growing Permit Requirements

As our organization grows and as land managers evolve their management plans, The Mountaineers is required to obtain permits for more and more areas. Please note that leaders are now required to carry a copy (or image on their phone) of our <u>nominal use letter</u> when recreating on trails in the Snoqualmie Ranger District. This goes for trips and field trips alike! Remember, the best place to get land manager info about permits is in the route/place listing - you will also find a link to this nominal use letter on the applicable route/place listings.
